Located in Mary's hometown of Baddeck, Vicar's View features three brand new units that pay homage to the history of the area. The Elsie Room, the Silver Dart Room and the Alex & Mabel Room are all inspired by Alexander Graham Bell and showcase local art created by Mary's sister-inlaw, painted on 100-year-old board from her Aunt Margaret's barn. Each room boasts lovely Bras d'Or lake views and offers amenities, storage and security for those travelling with specialized vehicles and equipment.





Norm and Mary recently retired to Cape Breton after living in Alberta for many years, where they owned a business in the oil and gas sector. "It's nice to come home," says Mary. "A big part of this is being here with family."

Though not originally from Cape Breton, Norm has come to love life on the island. "We're celebrating Celtic Colours – I'm wearing a kilt in the walk to Uisge Ban Falls. It's important for us to give back to the community and share and enjoy what makes this place special," he says. "We want to promote Victoria County and everything that is

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While Norm and Mary aren't new to taking risks and starting new ventures, they are new to the accommodations sector. "We did most of the work ourselves; it was a learning curve for us, and we are still learning when it comes to things like online and social media," says Norm. I'm glad we don't have shareholders," he jokes.

While it is early days, Vicar's View has been getting good feedback from guests from the region and from the UK, who appreciate great customer service in an accommodation geared to their specific requirements. Norm and Mary are willing to stay the course, while staying flexible to their guests' needs, especially when it comes to booking. "We will give ourselves a few years to stick to our guns and learn," says Norm.
