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Introduction

The Recovery Signals Digest is a bi-weekly overview of travel recovery indicators compiled by Tourism Nova Scotia.

The report provides timely insights for Nova Scotia's tourism industry about factors that influence travel recovery including cases of COVID-19 in Canada and internationally, vaccinations, visitation and travel intentions.

Source Notes and Methodology

- Statistics Canada (<u>www.statcan.gc.ca</u>) is the national statistical office. Its
 international arrivals data is sourced from the Canada Border Services Agency and
 from land ports equipped with the automated Integrated Primary Inspection Line
 system.
- The Nova Scotia Department of Finance is a department of the Government of Nova Scotia. It publishes Daily Stats on a range of economic and other data relevant to Nova Scotia (Nova Scotia Department of Finance - Economics and Statistics).
- Environics Analytics (https://environicsanalytics.com/) is a North American marketing information company. Its Weekly Tracker measures weekly domestic overnight visitation in Canada, using location data from mobile devices, sourced via privacy compliant third-party mobile data providers.



Source Notes and Methodology

- Destination Canada (<u>www.destinationcanada.com/</u>) is a federal Crown corporation
 and Canada's national tourism marketing organization. Its Travel Recovery
 Assessment is based on analysis of research by Destination Canada and thirdparty sources. Its Resident Sentiment survey is a weekly online poll of 1,800
 residents, with some questions alternating bi-weekly. The data is weighted to be
 reflective of the Canadian population.
- The Government of Canada's COVID-19 data (<u>COVID-19 daily epidemiology update Canada.ca</u>) is updated from sources including the Public Health Agency of Canada and provincial and territorial partners.
- Destination Analysts (<u>www.destinationanalysts.com</u>) is a San Francisco-based tourism market research firm. Its *American Travel Trends & Sentiment* report is based on an independent, weekly survey of 1,200 American travellers. The survey was launched in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic and has been conducted every week since March 15, 2020.



Summary

- Domestic tourism activity in Nova Scotia including travel by Nova Scotians within their home province fell more than 56% in April 2021 compared with April 2019, the largest decline of any province in Canada in that period, according to an analysis by the Nova Scotia Department of Finance.
- According to Statistics Canada's latest National Tourism Indicators, tourism spending fell another 3% in the first quarter of 2021, following a year-overyear decline of 49% in 2020. The non-resident share of overall tourism spending rose 9% in Q1 2021.
- Statistics Canada also reports that trips to Canada by international visitors were down 6% in April 2021 compared with March 2021.
- Overnight visitation to Nova Scotia in the third week of June was up 18% over the previous week (WoW), and up 25% compared with the same week the previous year (YoY), according to Environics' Weekly Tracker of mobile data movements.



Summary

- Destination Canada's latest Travel Recovery Assessment shows Nova Scotia and Ontario both progressing in late June from the Hyper-local (stage II) phase of recovery to the Intra-provincial (stage III) phase, where most other provinces are also situated.
- The federal government reports that the *number* of active COVID-19 cases in Canada continues to decline, with less than 6,000 cases as of July 5, down by half since mid-June. Nationally, the *rate* of active cases on July 5 stood at 15 cases per 100,000 people. In Nova Scotia, the rate was 5 per 100,000.
- Destination Analysts says optimism is waning among US travellers about the immediate outlook of the pandemic in that country, while at the same time a once-rising trend of excitement about leisure travel in 2021 has now stabilized.








In April 2021, combined tourism activity in Canada was 66.3% below the level in April 2019.




In April 2021, combined tourism activity in Nova Scotia was 65.6% below the level in April 2019.

 The Nova Scotia Department of Finance, using the Statistics Canada Tourism Activity data, has illustrated the relative tourism declines of Canada and of each province (April 2021 vs April 2019).


- Overall tourism: Nova Scotia's April decline of 65.6% was among the worst in Canada, slightly lower than the national decline of 66.3%.
- Domestic tourism (Canadian travel, including Nova Scotians visiting other parts of their home province): Nova Scotia's April decline of 56.5% was the largest drop among provinces, and higher than the national decline of 52.7%.
- Inbound tourism (travel from other countries): Nova Scotia's decline of 89.4% was somewhat lower than the national decline of 92.2%.

Statistics Canada: National Tourism Indicators – Spending Drops in Q1



- After a 49% drop year-over-year in 2020, tourism spending dropped another 3% in the first quarter of 2021.
- First quarter spending was 57% lower than the pre-pandemic levels of the fourth quarter in 2019.
- Spending by Canadians was down 3% in the first quarter of 2021.
 Domestic spending made up 96% of total tourism spending.
- Non-resident spending rose 9% in the first quarter of 2021, but remained 94% below the fourth quarter of 2019.

- Trips to Canada by travellers from abroad were down about 6% in April from the previous month, and down 93% from pre-pandemic levels in April 2019.
- Trips abroad by Canadians were up nearly 19% in April from the previous month, but down 93% from pre-pandemic levels in April 2019.






 About 89,000 overnight visitors came to Nova Scotia the week of June 14, 2021, down from about 98,000 the same week in 2019.




 About 89,000 overnight visitors came to Nova Scotia the week of June 14, 2021, up from about 71,000 the same week in 2020.




 The week of June 14, 2021, overnight visitation to Nova Scotia was up 18% over the previous week (WoW). In comparison, national weekly overnight visitation was up 9% WoW.



Environics Weekly Tracker – *Year Over Year* Change, Nova Scotia

Data reflects number of overnight visitors to Nova Scotia. The Weekly Tracker uses data based on mobile phone movements (60+ kilometers overnight travel), which may differ from other visitation estimates.



The week of June 14, 2021, overnight visitation to Nova Scotia was up 25% over the same week the
previous year (YoY). In comparison, national weekly overnight visitation was down 2% YoY.



According to Destination Canada's travel sentiment data, as of June 20:

- Alberta has progressed into the Inter-provincial (IV) phase of recovery, where it joins
 Yukon and Nunavut.
- Ontario and Nova Scotia have progressed into the Intra-provincial (III) phase, where they
 join British Columbia, Quebec, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland and
 Labrador and Northwest Territories.
- Saskatchewan and Manitoba remain in the Hyper-local (II) phase.







The count of total cases of COVID-19 in Canada was 1,417,639 as of July 5, 2021.









Government of Canada – COVID-19 Count of *Active* Cases

Government of Canada – COVID-19 Rate of Active Cases


The rate of active cases of COVID-19 in **Canada** was **15 per 100,000 population** as of July 5, 2021.






Government of Canada – COVID-19 Cases by *Date*

Total COVID-19 cases in Canada (n=1,414,929) by date of illness onset, as of July 2, 2021.






Government of Canada – COVID-19 World Cases Per 100,000 People





Government of Canada – Percentage With At Least 1 Vaccine Dose


The cumulative percent of the population who have received **at least one dose** of a COVID-19 vaccine in Canada was **67%** as of June 26, 2021.



Destination Analysts: Pandemic Outlook Darkens Among US Travellers




 Optimism is declining among American travellers about the immediate future of the pandemic. Although most say the situation will improve over the next month, an increasing share say things will get worse.

Question: Which best describes how excited you are about LEISURE TRAVEL in this year (2021)? (Please answer using the 11-point scale below)






Destination Analysts: Excitement About Leisure Travel Has Stabilized





Destination Analysts: US Welcoming Sentiment Wanes

Statement: I do not want travelers coming to visit my community right now.






 An increasing number of US travellers say they do not want other travellers visiting their home communities at the present time.



Destination Analysts: Sense of Return to Normal For Leisure Activities Increases
